BIBLE SCHOOL

Purpose—A course of Bible study for young women who desire a knowledge of the Bible as a true foundation for Christian living and service, also for those who wish to fit themselves for Christian work at home or abroad.

Course—A three years course is provided for those who can give only part of their time to study.

A special arrangement of this course, covering a period of one or more years is made for students giving full time.

Certificate—Credits will be given to those passing examinations and a certificate to all completing the course.

Graduates trained for Christian service will be accepted by missionary boards, provided they have had a general educational training and are recommended by the Board of Directors of the Bible School as to Christian character and ability.

Classes—Hours for classes at the Bible School 10:30 a. m., 5 p. m., and 8 p. m.

Lectures—Special lectures will be given during the School year by Dr. H. K. W. Kumm of the Sudan United Mis-

sion, Rev. Henry W. Frost of the China Inland Mission, Mr. Howard B. Dinwiddie of the Africa Inland Mission, Mr. H. P. Raud, Dr. and Mrs. W. M. Turnbull of the Nyack Schools, and others.

Extension Classes—Extension Classes held in Albany and other cities take the studies of the regular course or subjects adapted to the needs of the students.

Correspondence Course—Arranged for those unable to attend the school or extension classes.

Schedule—Schedule of classes and outline of studies may be secured from the Bible School.

Expense—No tuition is charged, but in answer to prayer all needs have been supplied through the offerings of students and friends.

Accommodations in the school for students desiring board and lodging, \$5.00 per week and upwards.

Literature—The Bible School Book Room carries a choice selection of Bibles, Testaments, and the latest devotional and missionary books.
